





Francisco Da Silva's (b. 1910) hallucinatory gouaches on paper are a transposition of his ephemeral street art: he originally started drawing with chalk and charcoal on the walls of the city of Fortaleza. The vinyl paintings of Eli Heil (b. 1929) betray a profoundly mystical tendency, whereas the vibrant acrylic paintings of Waldomiro de Deus (b. 1944) draw their inspiration from Brazilian folklore. Other major international artists from the collection include the Moroccan self-taught artist, Chaïbia Talal

(1929-2004), the Cuban painter, Manuel Mendive (b. 1944) and the Polish artist and photographer, Roman Cieślewicz (1939-1996).

The end goal of the Cérès Franco Collection project, masterminded by her daughter, the gallerist Dominique Polad-Hardouin, is to turn the current exhibition space, a refurbished winery called "La Coopérative", into a museum that can hold and display its artworks on a permanent basis, through rotating exhibitions.

Several local institutions and museums were involved in the planning of "L'Internationale des Visionnaires". In addition to works from the Cérès Franco Collection, it features artworks by significant artistes brut and singulier including Gaston Chaissac (1910-1964) and Michel Nedjar (b. 1947) from the nearby Abattoirs Museum's collection in Toulouse. Montolieu specialises in the rare book trade, and its Museum of Printing Arts and Trades held an exhibition on French artiste singulier and printer Pierre Bettencourt (1917-2006) in conjunction with the Cérès Franco exhibition. As it stands today, the Coopérative - Collection Cérès Franco is a great example of "glocalism", combining ambitious international outreach and comprehensive local anchoring. With time, it is hoped that it will attract foreign visitors and put Montolieu firmly on the map.
